

FIELD TRIAL SEASON NO. 149 COMMENCES

Minimum Requirements for Field Trials

The new field trial season has begun, and with the start of No. 149, it is timely to recall the sporting tradition we share and our obligation to promote and safeguard our time-honored sporting pastime.

Last season's wins are in the books; the victories, achievements, and perhaps the disappointments are a thing of the past.

Much of the game, as in most sporting pastimes, is luck — the luck of the draw, luck of the weather, luck when birds are moving, luck when your dog is “clicking just right.” It's been that way since 1874, when the first recognized trial was held in October near Memphis, Tenn.

Each new field trial season prompts optimism and enthusiasm. It is a new beginning, a fresh start. The advent of the 2023-2024 season provides an opportunity to review some pertinent items related to the field trial sport, among them the “Minimum Requirements,” the basic regulations governing recognized field trials.

Club officers are responsible for ensuring that trials are conducted fairly and in conformity with the Minimum Requirements—their first and foremost duty. A list of these requirements is appended.

When the trial is completed, the results — names of the winning dogs, their owners, and handlers — are to be submitted to the United Kennel Club as soon as possible. Results received well after the trial (60-90 days) cannot be assured that the trial will receive suitable coverage. Trial results received six months after the conclusion of a trial will not be recognized. This is a great disservice to the winning dogs, their owners, and handlers.

The No. 1 requirement is all-important for the recognition of a club's trial. The “Fixtures” columns carry the roster of upcoming recognized field trials. The name of the sponsoring club, date and place of the trial, and the name of the club official accepting entries must be shown in Fixtures at least 14 days before the date of the trial on the calendar at www.americanfield.com. Fixtures received well in advance will also appear in a printed edition of UKC® Field.

All clubs hosting trials where placements may qualify a dog for championship competition are to publicize that trial with a suitable advertisement showing the

date and place of the trial, location, time and date of the drawing, the stakes being sponsored, and the contact person (name, city, and state) who is accepting the entries.

- When owners and/or professional handlers enter dogs in a trial, they should provide full particulars (i.e., registered name and number of the dog, breed and sex, color, name of sire and dam) for their entries on the entry form. Club officials are responsible for forwarding the winners' complete particulars. Owners and handlers can assist them by providing specific information on each of their entries.

- The number of dogs competing in a stake determines how many placements the judges may award. In stakes with three dogs entered and competing, one placement may be awarded; in stakes with four or five dogs entered and competing, the judges may award two placements; and in stakes with six or more dogs, three placements may be awarded. [A fourth-place dog is named in a few select events, the Futurities, for example.]

- For dogs to receive credit for their field trial placements, they must be registered with the *Field Dog Stud Book*.

- All dogs (and all breeds) winning a championship placement (winner or runner-up) shall be required to have DNA on file with the *Field Dog Stud Book*. That requirement was subsequently extended to all dogs winning open stakes, earning points toward the Top All-Age and Shooting Dog of the Year Awards. DNA kits (instruction sheet, swab to collect cell samples, and an application form) are available and will be sent on request.

- Dogs earning Derby placements shall only receive credit for that win when that dog is registered with the *Field Dog Stud Book* at the time the win is awarded. (An application in process with the *Field Dog Stud Book* shall be deemed meeting this requirement.)

- When a club announces its trial in the advertising columns of UKC® Field and on the website calendar, the “order of running” is the prescribed schedule to be followed. Clubs are to adhere to the published “order of running.”

- Following the conclusion of the trial, particulars on the winners (name, number, breed, sex, etc.) should be forwarded to the United Kennel Club as soon as possible within 30 days.

Any violation of the Minimum Requirements will result in the voiding of the trial and the placements awarded.

One last item pertains to the use of colored collars to distinguish two similarly marked or similar-appearing dogs. Custom dictates that the “top” dog shall wear the “red” collar and the “bottom” dog the “lime-colored” collar.

Minimum Requirements for Field Trials for All Pointing Breeds

As adopted by the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America, the United Kennel Club, and the *Field Dog Stud Book*.

Wins will not be recognized and recorded unless the trial and/or each stake in which such win is made conforms to the following conditions:

- 1.) The name of the club, place, trial date, and the secretary's name and contact information must be listed on the calendar at www.americanfield.com at least 14 days before the trials are to be run. Information received well in advance will also appear in a printed edition of UKC® Field.

- 2.) Recognized stakes are:

Puppy Stakes: From January 1 to June 30 of each year for dogs whelped on or after January 1 of the year preceding, and from July 1 to December 31 of each year for dogs whelped on or after June 1 of the year preceding.

Derby Stakes: From July 1 to December 31 of each year for dogs whelped on or after January 1 of the year preceding, and from January 1 to June 30 of each year for dogs whelped on or after January 1 of the two years preceding.

All-Age: For dogs of any age. An “open” stake is one in which there are no limitations with respect to either dogs or handlers.

As defined by the By-Laws of the Amateur Field Trial Clubs of America, an “amateur” stake is one in which all handlers are amateurs. Winners in Members' and Shooting Dog All-Age Stakes will be recorded, but winners of Children, Ladies' Brace, and other stakes will not conform to the foregoing definitions and will not be recognized.

Championships, Winners' Stakes, and Futurities: Wins will be recorded only in such amateur events of this character as are recognized by the Amateur Field Trial

Clubs of America and in such open events as are recognized by the United Kennel Club and the *Field Dog Stud Book*.

3.) The minimum length of heats for all stakes other than Puppy Stakes shall be thirty (30) minutes on the basis of the time that an average brace takes to negotiate the course. In the case of one-course trials, no more than eight (8) minutes of the thirty (30) shall be spent in the birdfield. The minimum length of heats for Puppy Stakes shall be fifteen (15) minutes.

4.) A stake must be drawn no later than the night before the day the stake is advertised to be run.

5.) Dogs shall not be substituted after the draw.

6.) Braces shall be run and handled as drawn unless given prior consent of the judges, which consent must not be given for the purpose of accommodating owners, handlers, or dogs that are not available when reached in the regular order of the draw. In the case of withdrawals, the bracemates of such withdrawn dogs may be run together at the judges' discretion. Bitches which come in season braced with a male are scratched.

7.) No entry shall be accepted after a stake is drawn.

8.) No more than one brace of dogs shall be run on a course or any part of a course at the same time, irrespective of whether the dogs are in the same stake or in different stakes.

9.) Stakes shall be run only on recognized game birds whose flight shall not be impaired by caging, hobbling, wing clipping, brailling, or in any other manner.

10.) Bitches in season shall not be permitted to run in one-course trials. In multiple course trials, they may start only if, in the opinion of the judges, it can be accomplished under conditions which will ensure absolute fairness to other entries. Bitches in multiple course trials must be drawn in season and braced with a female.

Electronic Recovery, Tracking, and Communication Device Rules

The sole purpose of using the retrieval/recovery device in a field trial is to assist the handler in locating a dog that may be lost and which is deemed no longer in judgment. The UKC rules, as adopted by the AFTCA for the use of a dog recovery unit in all recognized stakes, are as follows:

1.) The collar and receiver are to be used as received from the manufacturer, and the collar may not have any capacity to receive any communication or commands from the receiver other than its sole intended purpose to locate the dog. No

modifications are to be made to the collar other than a name identification plate affixed. The collar must have a flat surface against the dog's neck. All components, including the collar, are not to exceed nine (9) ounces.

2.) Neither the handler nor the scout may have a receiver in their possession while their dog is under judgment. All of their receivers are to be given to the judges or a person designated by the host club.

3.) A receiver is any unit capable of receiving any signal from the collar, including but not limited to handheld devices, watches, and smartphones. The receiving unit must not have any capacity to shock, tone, vibrate, or deliver other behavioral commands to the collar. ALL receivers in the gallery, including those in the possession of the host club's designee, are to be turned OFF. (No one in the gallery shall "track" a dog while under judgment.)

4.) No outside communication—no one shall communicate in any manner with the handler, scout, judges, or gallery members with any information obtained through the use of a recovery device while dogs are under judgment.

5.) A receiver may only be activated once judgment has concluded. If a dog is gone at time, that dog is still under judgment until such time as the judges indicate otherwise or the handler requests the receiver unit. Once a handler requests the receiver, the dog is no longer in judgment.

6.) If a dog is lost from a previous brace, the handler or designee may use the receiving unit during the succeeding brace solely for the purpose of locating the lost dog. Once the dog is recovered, the receiver is to be turned off.

7.) The use of a recovery device is at the discretion of the host club. It is the handler's responsibility, if they choose to use one, to furnish the device. The running of the stake shall not be held up due to the lack of a recovery device.

8.) While competing, a dog shall wear no more than two (2) collars. If a handler elects to use a recovery unit, the collar shall remain on during the entire time the dog is under judgment. Removal of a recovery collar during the competition will result in the disqualification of that dog.

9.) Companion collar shall be no more than two (2) inches in width and not more than five (5) oz. in weight, used as received from the manufacturer without alteration. The only addition is that of an identification nameplate.

10.) It is the responsibility of the handler to give the judge or club designee the receiver unit in the OFF position. A

violation shall be the disqualification of the offending handler from the stake; the handler's remaining dogs in that stake may be run by a handler of their choosing should they elect to do so, but the violating handler cannot participate in any way in the remainder of that stake and the dog in that brace cannot be considered for placement in that stake.

11.) Any person using a receiver to locate a dog currently under judgment must be reported to the stake manager immediately, and the handler and dog are immediately disqualified from the stake. It is the responsibility of the host club to report in writing all violations of these rules to the UKC no more than seven (7) days from the date of claimed occurrence. Failure to report violations can result in the suspension of the club's ability to host *Field Dog Stud Book*-recognized events.

It cannot be reiterated too often that it is incumbent on club officials to ensure the integrity of the drawing and that they apprise trial participants of the rules governing the use of electronic devices at recognized trials.

Field trial participants are advised to keep these pages for future reference.

PURINA AWARDS PROGRAM

Awards Committee Meeting Minutes & Standards and Operating Protocol By Mark Johnson | Summerville, South Carolina | June 22, 2023

The Purina Awards Committee gathered on Friday, June 22, at the Hilton Garden Inn, Summerville, S. C. Committee members present were: Chairman Sean Derrig, Dwight Smith, Tom Griffin, and the writer Mark Johnson. Rick Stallings, Tim Ruff, and Mike Husemits were not able to attend due to health and/or family matters. Also present were Greg Blair representing Nestlé Purina—the sponsor of this extraordinary awards program, and Dominick Muoio, representing the United Kennel Club.

Chairman Derrig called the meeting to order at approximately 2:50 p.m. (EDT), and the writer distributed program material to each attendee. (Those unable to attend were mailed copies of all materials pertaining to this annual meeting). There were limited opening remarks, so the committee dove right into business.

Detailed review and discussion were held covering the 2022-2023 Purina Awards Program winners touching upon the success of each of the winning dogs, handlers, and owners. Mike Luebke and Dinora Wellmann provided the committee with exact point counts for each category tracked. Of note and reflecting accolades to this highly coveted awards program were the very close races for top dog in several categories. It was down to the wire as to who the winner would be. [Winners were announced in the July issue of UKC® Field.]

The committee reviewed prior year meeting minutes without additional discussion.

The committee then spent a good bit of time reviewing the “Standards and Operating Protocol” for this program, published in the July 2022 issue of the UKC® Field. As it pertains to the specific and comprehensive elements of the “Standards,” the committee fully ratified terminology and protocol as published with very limited verbiage amendments. A good level of time was spent discussing the Professional Handlers list, included with the Standards and Operating Protocol. In general, the committee wants to ensure that individuals applying for inclusion on the Professional Handlers list meet the following criteria:

1.) The applicant has handled and competed with their own string of at least three (3) dogs over the prior three (3) years.

2.) That those individuals apply directly to the Awards Committee in writing. Their application should outline specifics confirming compliance with the preceding point. The intent is to ensure that those listed as “professional handlers” are such and compete proactively on the open trial circuit. Consistent with this area of discussion, the following actions were taken:

- One listed handler was removed from the list by request and with the intent to return to amateur status.
- Two applications were approved and will be added to the 2023-2024 list
- Two applications were denied pending meeting above outlined requirements
- And one handler name change will be reflected in the upcoming season’s list.

Each of the above has been or will be advised directly regarding the above; additionally, the 2023-2024 Professional Handlers list will be adjusted accordingly.

The committee again entertained discussion regarding the purported dilemma involving the lack of sufficient professional handlers at several western U. S. trials and championships. While no obvious solution to this situation was fronted, chairman Derrig aptly reiterated that the Purina Awards Program and the obligations of the Awards Committee were to ensure that the program reflected a NATIONAL perspective. The concept of defining and administering a unique “western U. S.” program would not be acceptable; likewise, redefining amateur points calculations and program administration to include amateur wins in open stakes would be inconsistent with the definition and intent of an amateur status/competition as far as the Purina Awards Program is concerned.

Moving on, the committee evaluated nine (9) applications for points consideration, two of which were reinstatement applications. All of these were approved and will be included on the 2023-2024 rosters published in the UKC® Field. The writer has communicated directly with each of these applicants.

Additionally, four (4) trials/championships which had been listed will be removed from the approved rosters due to apparent inactivity and failure to report for two or more years.

This wrapped up the formal agenda items for the committee.

The floor was turned over to guests Muoio and Blair. Domenick Muoio referenced current UKC ad policies and indicated the potential for an Awards Program link on the UKC website. Greg Blair then discussed some of the ingredients of the new and exciting AFTCA-PURINA sponsorship program, along with the program’s operating philosophy and parameters.

The meeting was then adjourned at approximately 5 p.m.

Standards and Operating Protocol

The Purina Awards Program is sponsored by Nestlé Purina PetCare (Purina) and enjoys a long and extensive history of recognizing superior performances, handlers, and bird dogs in the field trial sport. The Top Field Trial Bird Dog Award (all-age) was established in 1963 and was sponsored by Ralston Purina. From the start, the Purina Awards Program was designed to stimulate interest in all field competition and recognize publicly the dog and handler which had excelled in a given field trial season. Over time, the program has evolved and expanded to include the Open Shooting Dog, Open Derby, Open Handler, Amateur Shooting Dog, and Amateur All-Age categories.

The primary role and responsibility of the Awards Committee is to administer the Purina Awards Program. This includes, but is not limited to, determining the manner in which the program shall be conducted, establishing a points system to determine the leading handlers and dogs, selecting trials where such points may be earned, and making determinations regarding other matters that may be related to the proper conduct of the Purina Awards Program.

The Awards Committee also carefully and consistently investigates written complaints—protest and/or negativity/conduct relative to Purina Awards Program events. Misconduct will not be tolerated and will be addressed decisively. When appropriate action is needed, it may include but is not limited to loss of points, loss of eligibility to be named handler/dog of the year, or both. In all cases, when a handler chooses to compete in a trial awarding Purina points, they agree to compete under the oversight of the awards program. The same applies to clubs and championships

that officiate approved Purina Points events.

Application for Recognition in the Program

In general, we are mindful that Purina Points trial status is not a given or automatically granted position. Purina Points trials must, in all cases, be reflective of premier bird dog competition, held on premier venues, showcasing top-notch handler and dog capabilities in a sportsmanlike and publicly appealing package. Purina Points trials and championships must also reflect baseline respect and appreciation for the MAJOR sponsorship contributions Nestlé Purina and the Awards Committee contribute to this significant and unrivaled bird dog awards program. Pertaining to new program applicants, an official application form must be submitted to the Awards Program recording secretary. New applications will be reviewed and acted upon by the full committee at their annual June committee meeting. Completion of an application does not guarantee approval. Typically, a three (3) year probationary time frame precedes approval.

Advertisement Requirements for Recognized Awards Program Events

- The Purina checkerboard logo must appear prominently in all points trial ads.
- United Kennel Club policy regarding the size of ads will prevail.
- Ads must appear in the UKC® Field/American Field website well ahead of the start of the event.
- Judges' full names must appear in the ad. Judges' "TBD" is unacceptable and can be cause for a club to lose points status. Likewise, changes in listed judges must be communicated to UKC and the Awards Committee.
- The starting date, venue, and stake particulars must appear in the ad.
- The Awards Committee must be notified of any and all changes to the running of a recognized and advertised Purina Awards trial via written/email notice to the recording secretary.

Standards and Protocol

- To qualify for annual points consideration, recognized Purina Awards Program points events must run a minimum of 16 dogs (derbies excluded). This standard has been in place for several years and reflects the program's intent to attract a broad event base reflective of the stature and prestige associated with the program.

Those approved events that are run but attract less than the 16-dog minimum must nevertheless report the fact that their trial was run, including submission of a running order (Open Shooting Dog stakes only) and the completed Form for Essential Data.

- All points trials must be reported to appropriate parties and the Awards Committee within 45 days of the event's conclusion. Points WILL NOT BE SCORED for clubs that fail to report results within 45 days of event completion. "Reporting" is defined as the submission of Form for Essential Data to the Open and Amateur Shooting Dog points tabulator—Mr. Mike Luebke—at trialpoints@outlook.com, along with a running order (for Open Shooting Dog stakes only) that indicates the dog's *FDSB* name and the handler's full name. Points WILL NOT BE SCORED for Open Shooting Dog stakes that fail to include a complete running order with their Form for Essential Data.

Note: trialpoints@outlook.com is the only acceptable manner to communicate results to Mr. Luebke and becomes the basis for his paper trail supporting his calculations. Open All-Age and Amateur All-Age stakes must be reported to the United Kennel Club in the traditional manner.

- Any change in venue must be approved by the Awards Committee.
- All dogs, handlers, owners, and club officials participating in approved Purina Awards Program field trials must be in GOOD STANDING with the *FDSB*/United Kennel Club. Additionally, clubs/championships that elect to accept entries from persons/dogs not in good standing with the *FDSB*/United Kennel Club effectively relinquish their status as a Purina Points trial.
- All federal, state, and local ordinances apply to points trials.
- Failure to comply with any of the above points will result in a loss of Purina Points for that trial and may include suspension from the Awards Program.

Professional Handler

- Within the context of the Purina Awards Program, a professional handler will be defined as a person or persons who has actively competed in American Field/United Kennel Club-sanctioned bird dog field trials for at least three consecutive seasons, with his own string of dogs numbering not less than three (3).

- Handlers indicated in the above-referenced list may be purged from subsequent years' listings due to inactivity in Open Shooting Dog Purina Points trials during the preceding year(s). Listed handlers will be expected to keep the Awards Committee aware of changes that would preclude their being listed.

- Consideration for additions to the approved professional handlers' roster can be made in writing and directed to the Awards Committee Secretary or any committee member. Such applications should indicate name/contact particulars

and kennel name, a summary of prior 36 months of handling dogs professionally, and a listing of Purina Points trials where dogs were handled as a professional. Consideration for additions will be at the committee's summer meeting.

Approved Points Trial Roster

- Annually, the United Kennel Club will publish a roster of approved Purina Points field trials—open, amateur, shooting dog, all-age, and derby.

- It is the responsibility of each club to confirm they have been listed.

Shooting Dog Points

Calculation Particulars

- The 16-dog minimum prevails with a minimum of three (3) active professional handlers.

- For stakes with 17-24 dogs entered, there will be a minimum requirement of four (4) active professional handlers for points to be counted.

- For stakes with 25 or more dogs entered, the requirement is five (5) active professional handlers.

- In cases where the threshold number of professional handlers, as described above, is not met, points will be calculated at the level corresponding to the actual number of professional handlers participating. For example, if an Open stake drew 30 dogs, but there were only three professional handlers, points would be calculated at the 16-dog level.

Once again, these criteria are not intended to be burdensome or bureaucratic. Rather, they are specifically intended to reflect the prestige and stature of recognized Purina Points events by creating a more inclusive and broader base of competition in the shooting dog category. Club officials are most certainly encouraged to reach out to area professional handlers encouraging them to join their field trials with the intent to win but also ensuring that maximum points

thresholds are met for points calculation purposes.

- A three (3) dog bye brace limit will be in effect for awards recognition. Points calculations will be reduced accordingly for excesses. For example, if a stake drew 36 dogs, six (6) of which were drawn as bye dogs' points would be scored for a field of 33 dogs only.

- Awarding of Points: One-course trial venue will receive half points, while three (3) courses will receive full points based on the number of dogs entered.

This program is administered by the Purina Awards Committee, and sponsored by Purina. Committee members are: Sean Derrig, Chicago, IL; Tom Griffin, Watsonville, CA; Mark Johnson, Winnebago, IL; Tim Ruff, Irmo, SC; Dwight Smith, Norwood, NC; and Rick Stallings, Matthews, AL.

The Award is based on accomplishments in amateur all-age trials with heats of one hour or longer. Points will be awarded based on the number of dogs officially drawn. First place will receive 10 points for each dog drawn, second place will receive 5 points and third will receive 3 points. Endurance trial points will be based on the length of the endurance trial.

*Bonus points are added for Futurity and All-Age Championship wins (doubled for Championships and most Futurities except the U.S. Quail

Shooting Dog which will receive bonus points of 150, 100, 75 and 50).

Winning Derbies, owners and handlers will be recognized at the Awards banquet. An original oil painting of the winning Derbies will be presented along with a generous supply of Purina product for the winners.

Those who chose to enter and compete in Purina Awards stakes agree to do so under the policies and rules established by the Awards Committee, United Kennel Club and FDSB standards, and those spelled out in the booklet "Standards to Field Trial Procedure, Judicial Practice, Handler and Bird Dog Performance".
